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Abstract of Proposal

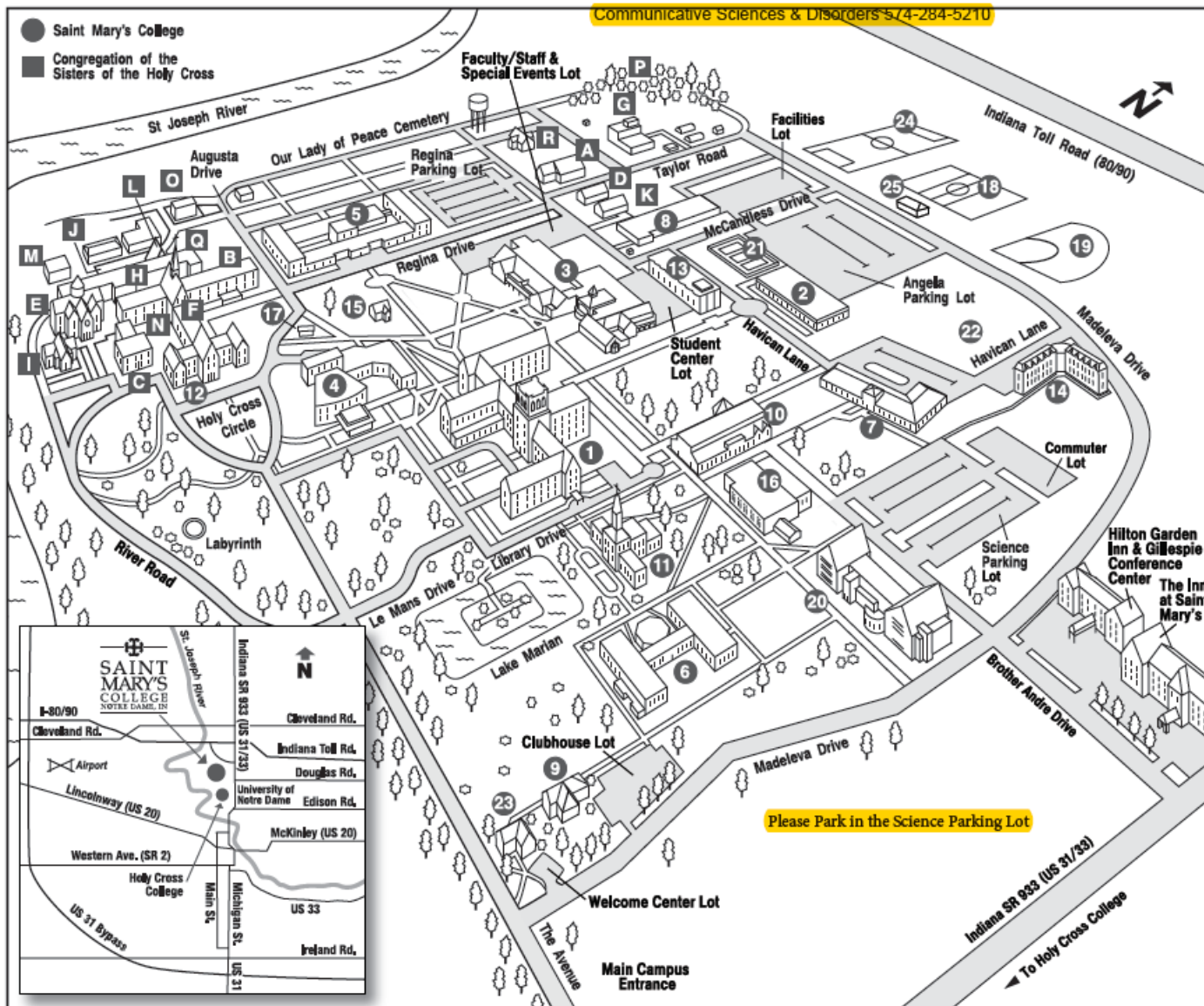
Person-centered care is emphasized as a best practice in general health care as well as speech pathology. This session is an introduction for SLPs treating adults to make simple choices in their practice to be person-centered and provide highly-meaningful, relevant therapy. A functional approach will be examined for various steps of the rehab process including the evaluation, goal setting, intervention, and home program design. Real life challenges will be addressed, as well as case examples throughout.

Learning Outcomes, Objectives

1. Explain how person-centered care differs from the medical model that was previously emphasized in speech therapy
2. List 10 rating scales that can be used as part of a person-centered assessment.
3. Use 3 evidence-based frameworks to write functional, person-centered, and measurable goals.
4. Describe 10 evidence-based cognitive-communication interventions that can be integrated with personally relevant stimuli to meet functional therapy goals.
5. Summarize how to create a personally relevant home program for language or cognitive goals.
